What are Community Gardens?

GVI's Community Gardens program is a network of organic gardens in Bridgeport dedicated to the nourishment and development of the city. They are gardened and loved by local neighbors. Each year, thousands of pounds of high quality, fresh food is harvested from these gardens and enjoyed at the tables of hundreds of people in our city.

In many cases, these gardens provide healthy, safe opportunities for Bridgeporters to grow food that is otherwise unavailable in the stores of that neighborhood!

Who is Green Village Initiative?

Green Village Initiative (GVI) is a non-profit in Bridgeport, CT whose mission is to grow food, knowledge, leadership and community, through urban gardening and farming, to create a more just food system in Bridgeport. We believe urban gardeners and farmers in our city are creating a more vibrant future. We support the gardening and farming movement so gardeners can continue to be leaders of positive change in their neighborhoods.

Most of the community gardens are on city-owned land. GVI is the bridge between the City of Bridgeport and our gardeners.

Who Keeps the Community Garden Growing?

Maintaining a network of prosperous gardens requires the City of Bridgeport, the GVI team, passionate Garden Captains, and community gardeners to work together.

- Garden Captains (p. 4-5) are present at every community garden. Captains are responsible for connecting to GVI about their garden and gardeners successes and needs throughout the season. If you are interested in becoming a captain, please ask to apply!
- GVI (p. 1) is the bridge between the City of Bridgeport, Garden Captains, and community gardeners. GVI is held accountable for well-maintained, well-used gardens. We at GVI agree to invest available time and resources into gardens that meet our expectations of being inviting, well-kept, and organic spaces and follow our guidelines and policies throughout the season.

In return. GVI will:

- Be a bridge between the City and the gardening community to make sure there is access to land, water, woodchips and other support.
- Provide seeds and seedlings each year. Some seedlings are grown by our team at Reservoir Community Farm; some are donated from other farms.
- Help recruit volunteers for garden clean-ups and rebuilds.

- Purchase and deliver soil and tools when funding is available, based on Garden needs.
- Fundraise for rebuilds, and coordinate rebuilds, when needed.
- Collect contact information from people interested in gardening.
- Conduct free workshops about gardening, farming, and social justice, open to anyone interested, not just active gardeners. These are opportunities for gardeners to share their knowledge with others.
- Offer leadership workshops for gardeners in our network, based on gardeners' interests.

The City of Bridgeport owns most of the land on which community gardens grow and agrees to coordinate with gardens in the GVI network for trash and brush pickup, providing water to gardens, and other necessities, if gardens are safe and well-kept.

Community Garden Captains Agreements & Roles

Garden Captains set an example as leaders and role models. Each Garden must have a Captain assigned as the main point of contact for gardeners and GVI.

Community Garden Captains agree to:

- Create a Check-in schedule with GVI for the season.
 - This can be a phone call, meeting, or email every other week.
- Honor our registration process and collect contact information for every plot.
 - Assign 1 garden plot per family or household.
 - Keep an up-to-date gardener list and submit a copy to GVI when changes are made.
- Follow up with gardeners who are not maintaining plots; use our guidelines and process for unmaintained beds.
- Recruit gardeners as soon as space is available.
 - Contact GVI for a list of interested individuals on the waitlist!
- Ensure garden plots are well kept and common areas are free of trash and weeds, including fence lines.
- Organize community garden meetings for orientation, cleanups, and other needs.
 - Contact GVI for help recruiting volunteers.

- Enforce GVI's Water Saving Policy (p. 5-6).
 - Inform GVI of any water leaks immediately.
- Handle gardeners' disputes and conflicts as needed and use the Conflict Resolution Process (p. 8).

In some gardens Captains have access to two plots in exchange for fulfilling the role of Garden Captain. This is not a requirement; this decision should be made among the gardeners and captain. All Garden Captains receive training and a stipend from GVI.

Water Saving Policy in Community Gardens



GVI understands that water is not a limitless resource and strives to save water at all times. Community gardeners are stewards. This water conservation policy is in place at all community gardens.

- 1. Water saving with good gardening practices is important for use of community garden sites.
 - a. Efficient Watering: Watering the root area of plants to maximize water intake. Watering plant leaves means water will quickly dry up and be wasted. Remember recent rainfall when deciding how much water to use.
 - b. Soil Building: Use of mulch (leaves/straw/grass clippings) to stop water from drying up and promote compost and organic matter that increases absorption of water by the soil around your plants' roots!
 - c. Smart Planting: Choose plants that require less water and can handle dry conditions. Look at Square Space gardening to help your plants shade your soil and save water.
 - d. Limiting Watering Hours: We advise not to water your plants during high temperature times of day (10am-2pm). Most of this water will quickly dry up and not be absorbed by your plants.
- 2. GVI, the City's Department of Public Facilities, and Aquarion, will work together to ensure that water is provided from May to November.

- **3.** Rain Gauges are available for every garden to deter gardeners from using water during times of rainfall.
- 4. Garden Captain's are responsible for observing, reporting and getting involved when something might result in an overuse of water. Broken pipes, running hoses, or over-watering are the most common ways that water can be wasted. Garden Captains must report challenges to GVI.
- 5. No-Standing-Water Policy is in effect at every garden. This policy, and training sessions to ensure its implementation, are communicated during monthly workshops for gardeners. During garden visits made by a GVI representative, checks for standing water are made and any standing water is eliminated. Standing water encourages mosquitoes to breed and hurt our communities.
- 6. Communication With City Officials: Community gardeners should communicate any observations or concerns to GVI. GVI will communicate issues or concerns with the City Parks and Recreation Department.

SUGGESTED GARDEN SAFETY ACTIONS

• Wash tools with soap and water







• Wash your hands 20 seconds

 You must wear gloves when in the garden



 When in the garden, you must wear a cloth face covering



 Use disinfectant cleaner on gates, shed doors and other frequently touched surfaces



• Stay 6 feet from others




 Avoid using your phone at the garden

Conflict Resolution Process



Community Gardener Agreements ☐ I will treat others with respect and maintain friendly, positive interactions. ☐ I will come to all interactions with my Garden's best interests in mind, rather than personal interests. ☐ I will follow organic growing practices. I will only use organic fertilizers, pesticides or weed control and ask a Captain before using any product about which I'm unsure. ☐ I will clean up any trash that I see in the garden regardless of who left it there. ☐ I will respect garden tools and equipment (such as hoses and wheelbarrows,); and keep things tidy. ☐ I will only compost uncooked fruits or vegetables, without any oils or seasoning of any kind, in the appropriate place. ☐ I will adhere to the Water Saving Policy and report leaks to my Captain. ☐ I will never have alcohol or illegal substances or conduct illegal activity in my Garden. ☐ I will maintain only my plot, unless permission has been given, and my Captain is aware that I have been asked to maintain another plot in our Garden. ☐ Anyone working my plot will be with me or introduced to my Captain. If I will be out of town, I will introduce my Captain to the person who will temporarily maintain my plot. ☐ I understand that all Community Gardens must be kept clean and well maintained for the entire growing season; May through October. If they are not, we all risk losing the garden. ☐ I understand that I must maintain my plot. If I do not it can be reassigned to someone on the waitlist, and I will respond to my Captain's requests to clean out my plot if asked. ☐ I agree to sign up for the GVI email and newsletter. ☐ I agree to clean out my plot for winter by the end of October. ☐ I agree that my garden registration is valid for one year and is renewable October-March.
